Eval Comments: The behaviors described today reflect the dog's responses in an Animal Care Center environment and during assessment. A dog's behavior in an Animal Care Center may differ significantly from how they behave in a home. Stress, confinement, and unfamiliar surroundings can cause dogs to act out—or suppress behaviors that may emerge later. A dog's behavior may change based on surroundings, training, medical, socialization, and life experiences.

Wimbo A5778371 (Altered) was reactive upon the runner's arrival, barking and growling as he muzzled-punched the barrier. His responses intensified after a pet corrector tool was used. However, Wimbo settled with a firm verbal correction, allowing himself to be leashed with ease. Wimbo bolted out of the kennel and proceeded to make his way to the catch pen with a strong pull on the leash, weaving around the runner as they passed through the kennels. Once inside the catch pen, he was collared and leashed without issue. Wimbo was allowed into the yard, where he wasted no time making friends with one of the dogs, prompting the other dog to engage in chase play. Wimbo continued interacting with the same dog, maintaining a high pace and a relaxed posture throughout the interactions. He occasionally took a break to solicit petting from one of the handlers. For the rest of the session, Wimbo maintained a social demeanor as he continued to zoom around the yard. Once the session concluded, he was returned to his kennel without incident. Wimbo could benefit from continued socialization in a yard with active dogs, as this could further develop his social skills.
