Shiloh was lying on his bed, but stood up to greet the runner with a relaxed body, soft eyes, and a loose tail wag. He was easy to leash and remove from the kennel, pulled moderately on leash while greeting his neighbors, and was easy to collar while soliciting petting. In the catch pen, his body relaxed, his eyes were soft, and his tail was high with a loose wag. He entered the yard, and exchanged appropriate greetings with the other dogs. He engaged in play with a loose tail wag, and was tolerant of being mounted by the other dogs. He solicited petting from the handlers. He maintained a relaxed and friendly demeanor for his entire stay in the yard. Shiloh is tolerant of the other dogs, has a medium energy level, and prefers a gentle-dainty playstyle.

He approached the handler with a neutral body, soft eyes, a slightly open mouth, and a high tail with a loose wag. He allowed the handler to pet his whole body, occasionally glancing at the handler with concerned eyes when she touched his paws. He did not growl or try to bite, and remained easy to handle for the remainder of the assessment. When the assessment was over, he wandered off to explore the yard, but continually returned to the handler to solicit petting.
